







RELIEF


Your print is of whatever you DID NOT carve








Stamps are a form of relief printing



INTAGLIO

Ink falls into the incisions & the ink on the plate is wiped away, making a print of whatever you DID carve







Leaves an impression of the plate



PLANOGRAPH

Your print is created from ink laid down onto a flat surface











The seriograph (a.k.a silk screen or screenprint) is a type of planograph print

Monotype



Monotyping* is a type of printmaking made by drawing or painting on a smooth, non-absorbent surface. The image is then transferred onto a paper by pressing the two together. It creates a single, unique print.


* Not to be confused with a monoprint.




Collaged objects

Your print can combine relief and intaglio methods, but will also include collaged objects onto the plate which will leave an impression of the object itself and its texture.

Collagraph Chine-collé





Paper of a different color or texture (such as tissue paper) is adhered to the initial printing surface. Chine-collé is not a printing method but a technique to add to your overall print.
